A Word from the Fold

Dear People of Good Shepherd,

We, the Vestry, are respectfully asking you to consider making a supplemental pledge to Good Shepherd now so that we can balance the 2022 budget. We ask that you prayerfully consider an additional pledge of \$15 per week (or \$785 total) for 2022. If we all pledge that additional amount, we



will BALANCE our budget, at the beginning of the year. The entire focus of this year could then be on our ministries and our lives together in community.

We are roughly \$40k below what we need to operate the church. As before, Good Shepherd is reliant upon pledges for a significant portion of our budget (90%). Fixed costs, which include personnel, building, etc., mean that there is not much that can be cut from our budget. How have we arrived at this position? As is the case for many organizations, there is a lagging effect of the pandemic in terms of finances. It has been difficult to welcome new people to the fold with so many restrictions on gatherings. We have not had any rental income since the beginning of the pandemic. Other reasons are not directly related to the pandemic. Costs across the board have increased steadily. We've given basic cost of living raises for staff and have invested in an excellent music ministry. On the income side, we cannot count on the substantial one-time gifts that came in last year happening once again and there have been decreases in some pledges due to economic hardships and others moving away. We do not want to alarm you, but we want to be completely transparent about the situation that we face. It is sobering but not insurmountable.

There is good news. The Vestry has pledged that there will be no additional appeals for monies in support of the operating budget this year. In keeping with this pledge, the Vestry also intends to hold back on all capital improvement fundraising. (Note that there may still be mission fundraising, for those who are called to participate.) We have built momentum with Rev. Ellie's energy and focus during this, her first year with us, and we want all the staff to be secure and supported in their missions. We are emerging (God-willing) from the pandemic.

We want to maintain our focus on building – on Resurrection, as Rev. Ellie has so eloquently framed it. If we had to focus on money throughout the year, it would drain energy away from mission and growth. You will see that there is no fundraising line item in the balanced budget to be presented at the Annual Meeting. The budget does include a children / youth staff position starting later this year, reflecting our commitment to youth and families.

We are very aware that \$785 is no insignificant amount of money. We do not make this request lightly. It might be less overwhelming when considered on a weekly basis – \$15 (three lattes from Starbucks). Or \$65 a month. We are not asking for a lump sum but rather a pledge increase. Some people will be unable to afford an additional \$785 this year. Please commit to giving what you can, whatever that additional amount may be. If you can give above \$785, that will help those who cannot give as

much. Together, we CAN do this.

This year can be about faith, worship, growth, outreach, mission, and abundance. Please make this additional pledge now. Please do so, ideally, not later than Sunday, February 6. The Vestry will vote to approve the 2022 Good Shepherd budget at their meeting on Tuesday, February 8. To pledge an additional amount, please complete this <u>form</u>. Alternatively, e-mail our Treasurer, <u>Denise Kelly</u>, with the details. Thank you.

Annual Meeting

Please join us for the Annual Meeting of the Church of the Good Shepherd on Sunday, Feb.13 following 9:00am Eucharist

`We encourage all parish households to attend our Annual Meeting. This year, in light of ongoing COVID concerns, you may attend our Annual Parish Meeting on February 13 in person or via Zoom. The in-person meeting will take place in the Sanctuary in order to have the benefit of the video setup and of more space for social distancing. The meeting will immediately follow the one worship service that Sunday at 9am. Those who attend via Zoom, and wish to vote at the Annual Meeting, must complete a proxy authorization form prior to the start of the meeting.

****A note about voting at the annual meeting

We were recently informed by the Diocese that the special authorization of the Legislature of the Commonwealth which allowed members of incorporated parishes to vote remotely in parish meetings expired on December 15, 2021. Parish members are, however, permitted to vote by proxy if they are not in attendance, with

proper authorization **Proxy Voting Authorization:**

If you intend to attend our Annual Parish Meeting remotely on Zoom, and you would like to vote on the measures before us,^{*} you must complete and return the proxy form according to instructions no later than the beginning of Annual Meeting (approximately 10am on February 13). This will allow you to vote "unofficially" on Zoom and have your vote "officially" recorded in person by proxy, as indicated by your Zoom vote. To submit your proxy form, please print it out, sign it and either bring a paper copy to church prior to 10am on Annual Meeting day, Feb 13, OR take a photo of your signed form and email it back to Harry Peebles.com. You may not vote by proxy unless you attend via Zoom.

* Votes at the 2022 Annual Meeting include: accepting the minutes of the 2021 Annual Meeting, accepting the agenda for the 2022 Annual Meeting, accepting the 2022 Annual Report, and electing the slate of officers and members of the Vestry and our representatives to Diocesan Convention.

Jr. Warden's Message



Howdy folks! You may be interested in what's going on in the back of the sanctuary. It's an attempt to make the church service Zoom experience as close to the inperson experience as possible. The in-

tent is for people in Zoom-land to feel like they are on equal footing with their fellow parishioners. In some ways, Zoomers actually have a better view of the action. Here are production details about how that is accomplished.

Audio mixing:

Tom is stationed at a pretty-cool-looking console. His primary focus is creating a pleasant mix from 8 microphones (Ellie, Ken, pulpit, organ, piano, Ellen, choir, ambient) to Zoom. Tom's "chain-saw"-style ear protection allows him to use regular ear buds to isolate the mix that goes out to Zoom. He also creates a different mix using fewer mics for the sanctuary. This second mix is what allows people in the sanctuary to hear Ellie, Ken, and lectors so clearly. The wifi-router on the top of the console is how the wireless mics connect.



Video mixing:

Denise has the brightest toys. On the big screen, the horizontal row of four images is from the four available cameras. Two cameras are stationary. In her hand is the remote that controls two more cameras. The top-right image is what's live on Zoom. The lit-up black switching box next to her coffee is for camera selection. The laptop is the main computer combining everything that goes out to Zoom. Above that, the blackish screen is used for displaying still images for Zoom and the prelude/postlude composer information. If necessary, she can monitor the incoming Zoom feed via that iPhone on the little stand.



Zoom hosting:

Harry is annotating his copy of the service leaflet with production notes. He's monitoring the Zoom audio after it has made the round trip back from the internet. He periodically spot-checks that throughout the service. Harry frequently has his earphones off, because he's also monitoring the insanctuary audio. The iPad on the right is a remote control for the audio-mixing board. Harry uses it for tweaks. The laptop on the left is used for Zoom moderating. He'll let folks in Zoom-land know when the prelude is about to begin, mute folks who forget to mute, and invite them to speak up for announcements and to unmute for virtual coffee hour after the postlude. The laptop in the middle controls what Ken and Ellie see on the TV Monitor. That gives them a sense of who's online, and lets them interact "face-to-face" with Zoomers. In this role,



Harry is also responsible for the Parish Hall Zoom setup in case there are overflow in-person attendees.

Fun toys! The team takes turns serving in



each of these roles. Everyone is welcome to learn how! This is a wonderfully satisfying ministry. Harry Peebles,






Exploring the Scriptures — Gratitude

Thank you to everyone who shared this month in the Epiphany service with El Ocotillo, partook in our Pupusa Truck meal, or contributed to the El Ocotillo scholarship fund. Your participation in this sister relationship and generosity is helping a student reach his or her potential.

We are sponsoring eight students in 2022 who range from ninth grade to university. In El Salvador, ninth grade (\$25/month) is considered junior high, high school (called baccalaureate) (\$45/month) can be 2-3 years depending on the path a student chooses, and university (\$100-120/ month) is typically five years with the last year being a thesis year. Our financial support, as noted in parenthesis, is usually 50% of the cost of education with the exception of one full university scholarship (\$240/month) for a student who cannot afford the family portion.

Let me share the profiles of three of our students:

Idania Patricia Martinez Perez is Claudia's granddaughter. Claudia and her husband were the community leaders instrumental in settling the village of El Ocotillo after the war. On our 2006 trip to El Ocotillo, Idania was a little two-year-old sweetly dropping pebbles in each of our hands while we had a meeting with her grandfather. She is now 17 years old and a freshman at the University of El Salvador studying computer technology.

Edith (pronounced "Edeet") Martinez

Rodriguez is 22 years old. She is in her thesis year at university and will graduate *magna cum laude* in June with a degree in agronomics. We are so proud of her and can't wait to see what she does with her degree!

Roselia Araceli Martinez is 27 years old. Her education was interrupted four years ago by a terrible accident that required surgery and an arduous recovery. Roselia lives in a house down a very long steep path with her husband and two young children. Her loved ones carried her in a hammock up that path to get her to medical appointments. She is fully recuperated and will graduate in June with a nursing degree.

The Good Shepherd community shares in the pride that the students' families feel for what their sons and daughters are accomplishing. Thank you for your part in supporting their hard work and providing a culture of possibility for all of the children in the village.

The Acton Area Interfaith Partnership

In our fall meeting, the Mission Outreach Committee discussed seeking ways to collaborate with other congregations in the Acton area for local community outreach. Within days Rev. Cindy Worthington Berry from UCC, Boxborough, reached out to us and several other congregations about coordinating a response to the pending arrival of Afghan refugees. The Acton Area Interfaith Partnership has grown from that original



endeavor to include South Acton Congregational Church, First Parish Church of Stow and Acton, St Matthews United Methodist Church, Apple Valley Catholic Collaborative, Church of Good Shepherd, and Trinity Chapel of Shirley. UCC Boxborough and Temple Beth Elohim have partnered together to sponsor an Afghan family, providing an apartment in Marlboro and wrap-around support for 2 adults and 4 children.

The group meets on Zoom most Thursdays from 6:00-7:00 pm to share experiences and coordinate upcoming needs. Up to this point the Partnership has supported the startup of a Halal food pantry in Lowell and food deliveries to homes, clothing and home goods collections, and our own gift card and winter clothing drives. It has worked with both IINE (International Institute of New England) in Lowell and ICNA Relief (Islamic Circle of North America).

Did you know?

- In the fiscal year 2020 there were 26 million refugees worldwide.
- Prior to 2017 United States resettled 75,000-85,000 refugees per year.
- Beginning in 2017 numbers were reduced and by the year 2020 US resettled only 11,800 refugees.
- Between the years 2017-2021, 150 resettlement agencies in the United States closed. There are now 200 agencies.
- In the fiscal year Oct 2020-Sept 2021 IINE resettled only 104 refugees.
- This year IINE will resettle 800 new refugees including 500 Afghans.
- Most Afghan refugees arrive with only a twoyear visa and need to apply for more permanent status.

If you'd like to get a current update from IINE on the progress of Afghan resettlement this meeting held on January 19th, <u>Virtual Town Meet-</u> ing, recording is very interesting. It includes an interview with the rector of St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Newburyport that is housing two families.

Creation Care

Can I Recycle This??



I had some black plastic take out containers that I was planning on recycling. Then I remembered the RECYCLOPEDIA on **recyclesmartma**. **org.** All I had to do was type in "black plastic" and here's what they said:

Trash: Bottom: Put this item in your <u>trash bin.</u> Instructions:

Top: Rinse and <u>recycle clear plastic lids.</u>

Why are the lids okay but not the black plastic?

The reason we say no to black plastic is because recycling facilities sort plastics by bouncing a beam of light off them. Since black plastic absorbs light, it can't be sorted and goes straight through the system and off to landfill or incineration. Most current (and past) black plastic uses carbon to make the black, which absorbs the beam so the reader can't identify the resin. The same is true for really dark colors in general (dark grays and sometimes navy).

It's fun and clears up recycling confusion. Ask your kids to do it! Try it!

November Vestry Vignettes

We began with prayer and then a check in on God's abundance and generosity; Vestry members were invited to share their personal experiences of God's abundance since our last meeting.

Stewardship Update:

Chris O'Leary has joined the stewardship committee. As leaders of the Parish, Vestry members are encouraged to get their pledges in early. There will be options for mail-in and electronic pledges, and we will have weekly messages with different themes each week. They would like Vestry members to help make calls for any late pledges. There will be a pastoral focus to these calls when appropriate.

Finance Update:

We are still on track to meet our budget, though by year end we may end approximately \$2,000 behind, which isn't bad given the challenges of 2021. The appeal for the sound system more than covered the deficit; we are about \$500 in excess of what we needed. We truly appreciate that contributions were so generous.

Sound System & Elevator:

We are working on wiring for the speakers; however, due to supply chain challenges, we may not get the speakers until after Christmas. We're looking for ways to simplify the setup, moving the table to the back of the sanctuary. We'll be able to move the camera from the middle aisle which will make equipment less intrusive.

We are making progress on the elevator: the shaft has been widened, and the elevator order has been placed and will arrive after Christmas.

Regathering:

We are averaging over 80 people across the 3 congregations every Sunday (8 am, 10 am in person and Zoom), with 8 consistent new people attending each Sunday. The overflow space is up and running and is a regular option so people no longer need to sign up in advance for a service.

We are starting to get requests for use of the building; Cub Scouts on Fridays and Girl Scouts on Sundays are now regular users. We are looking forward to bringing people into our building as a means of community outreach.

Advent and Christmas Planning:

A Blue Christmas service is scheduled for December 19. On Christmas Eve we will have a 4:00 pm in-person Holy Eucharist/Family Service, and 5:30 and 7:30 pm Candlelight Vigils in the parking lot. Christmas Day will be a pre-recorded, family-oriented service on YouTube. On January 9 we will have an Epiphany-themed Lessons & Carols in person. We may invite the El Ocotillo community to participate through Zoom.

Vestry Membership/Nominations:

We are looking for 5 new vestry members, a Clerk, and a Senior Warden. Ellie discussed that we may need to consider fewer members to provide continuity.

Other Business:

The parking lot needs to be repainted, and cracks repaired.

Closing Prayer and Dismissal.

December Vestry Vignettes

For Opening Prayer, Ellie read from Poems by Jan Richardson, "*Blessed Are You Who Bear the Light*". The Vestry did an Advent Meditation on "*A Blessing for traveling in the Dark*".

Upcoming Services:

On the fourth Sunday of Advent, December 19, there will be Holy Eucharist at 8 & 10 am. Our Blue Christmas Liturgy will be that afternoon at 4 pm, and will be followed by the Greening of the Church.

On Christmas Eve, we'll have a Festive Candle-lit Eucharist at 4 pm (in person and on Zoom), with Christmas Eve Candle-lit Vigils at 5:30 pm and 7:30 pm. Christmas Day will have a recorded service online, accessible at any time. Sunday, Dec. 26 will be Christmas 1 with HE at both 8 am and 10 am. On January 2, Christmas 2, Deacon Ken will lead Morning Prayer at both 8 am and 10 am. Epiphany Lessons & Carols with Eucharist will be on January 9 at 10 am, one service live-streamed with El Ocotillo.

Regathering:

Since we began indoor services on 9/19/2021, our Average Sunday Attendance (ASA) is 94.75, which is about where it was in 2020 pre-Covid.

Sound System:

Speakers are still delayed, but all the infrastructure has been installed and is ready for the speakers.

The Tech Team has moved its table to the back to improve safety and aesthetics, additionally making set-up easier.

Elevator:

The Elevator is here! Installation could take up to 5 days to complete. We can't use it until it is inspected, and currently inspections are being scheduled into January.

Deacon's Report:

Ken went to First Connections which is doing diaper pantry donations with other area churches. They provide a full range of programs for new parents in Acton and the surrounding communities. He will connect with Barb Magee about Good Shepherd's collecting diaper donations for them.

Finance Update:

2021 YTD we are in a good place. Net income is positive \$27,000, but we expect by year end to break even. Pledges will be a little bit behind budget, but close we hope. We are using the 2021 income number as a placeholder for the 2022 budget. Current pledge numbers are around \$240,000 and we need them to be closer to \$293,000, and so the Finance Committee is looking for places where we can cut line items. It was decided that the Finance Committee will create 3 different budgets based on different pledge scenarios.

We believe we need to have a year-round Stewardship Committee.

The Vestry approved a Motion for staff salary increases to move from each staff member's anniversary year to a single annual increase date, with 3% increases for 2022. The Vestry approved a Motion to designate \$56,000 of Ellie's Total Cash Compensation as Housing Alllowance.

Warden's Report:

Lydia has been working on publicity for the church. There will be an article on our Blue Christmas service in the Acton Beacon.

We need to think about sidewalk safety as we approach winter, as the walkway can be very icy, Harry will be asking for volunteers to just stop by for a few minutes and spread salt and sand on an as needed basis.

We need to put service times on the signs that hang on Newtown Rd

Wendy Fedderson will be the new Sr, Warden

Harry Peebles took care of the first floor gutters on the Rectory; the Rectory furnace needs to be serviced for winter.

Closing Prayer and Dismissal.

January Vestry Vignettes

Opening Prayer was followed with a reflection on the budget.

Recap over Advent, Christmas, & Epiphany:

Attendance Christmas Eve over the three services was approximately 150 people, The Tech Team did a great job with the quick last minute move for the 4:30 pm service to be outdoors, as did the choir.

Deacon's Report:

Starting this Sunday, Ken will lead a book group discussion of *Love Is the Way* by Bishop Curry. We dropped off 4-5 boxes of diapers with First Connections.

Wardens' Report:

Lydia: The Nominating Committee met on Sunday and made progress. Rafael and Anna will each continue on for 1-year terms each. Wendy Fedderson will be the new Senior Warden.

Harry: Speakers arrived on December 26. Please ask people if the sound in the sanctuary is meeting

their needs. The elevator is ready for use once it has been inspected.

Annual Meeting Planning:

Ellie forwarded the e-mail from the Diocese prior to the Vestry meeting. The Governor's exemption for an in-person meeting has expired, therefore we have two options: the first is to postpone the Annual Meeting; the second is to hold the Annual Meeting via Zoom and give every parishioner the opportunity to vote by proxy. The Vestry agreed that postponing the Annual Meeting was not the desired option, so we will send the Proxy notice with the Warrant via email and invite parishioners to complete an online form designating a proxy vote.

Laura drafted the Warrant which Vestry approved.

Finance:

2021 Budget and year end status: On the income side, pledges were slightly behind for the year, but we received a lot of gifts which helped to offset the difference. We are behind in other income areas (Easter, Plate, Christmas), but our total income was only \$1400 less than originally budgeted. Total expense savings were around \$17,000 which enabled us a year ended with a positive Balance of \$16,500.

It was recommend that we set aside \$6,304.75 of the overage for Rectory Real Estate Tax, and the motion was approved.

Finance:

2022 Budget: Finance Committee prepared three budgets with three different assumptions about pledges, all of which had negative year end balances. Best case scenario is -\$29,500. The Vestry agreed to meet on Jan 25, after all the late pledges should be in to discuss the budget.
