A Word from the Fold

Open for Prayer

A few weeks ago, I woke up early after a fitful night of sleep. As I tried to fall back asleep, I suddenly had a very clear sense that I needed to make the church available for prayer that day. It was a Thursday. So, when I arrived at church that morning, I scrounged around, found a dry erase sign board in a closet, and hastily wrote the words that had come to me in prayer: "Seeking Peace? Church Open for Prayer". I placed it by the entrance to the driveway on Newtown Road.

Less than half an hour later a man walked in. He had been jogging by and saw the sign. As we watched him approach the building, Ellen Oak and I looked at each other and smiled. That was easy! It turned out he was looking for a restroom. But he admitted he would not have known to come in, had he not seen the sign. He was very appreciative. I laughed to myself thinking that this was God's sense of humor at work.

Many hours later, as I was getting ready to head home, I noticed a woman standing in the courtyard. After a few moments she en-

tered the building, went up the stairs and spent about fifteen minutes in the church before quietly leaving. I do not know who she was. I do not know what she needed. But I know that she was the reason God had woken me up that morning.

A parish church like ours has many functions. Many reasons for being. If I asked you to list a few you might say: to be a place of worship; to share God's Good News; to build and find community; to form Christians; to follow Jesus; to support one another in times of challenge and joy, to make a difference in the world. We are proud of our commitment to being a caring community of faith, engaged in mission and immersed in compelling worship.

We are also a house of prayer. —A place where we can know and experience God. —A place where we can be still and find peace. —A place where we can listen for God's voice. Sometimes that connection to God comes amidst community, flows out of our corporate worship, is celebrated in sharing Sacrament and ministry together. Sometimes that closeness to God is found while exploring God's great creation, and it knows no bounds.

Other times that still small voice comes to us in silence, in the midst of sacred space set apart for prayer.

For about two weeks now I have placed the handwritten 'Church Open for Prayer' sign along the driveway on the days I have been at the church. I am not sure how many, if any, have to come in to pray. The number is not important. What matters is that our church be available to all who need it. The world is a mess right now.

People are frightened and hurting. And while I believe God can be accessed anywhere, and prayer doesn't have to be offered from an altar to be heard, our church exists to be a house of prayer for all people. Sacred, quiet space may be exactly what someone needs as they drive, walk, or jog on by.

Today, two new signs arrived. These have bolder colors and won't run in the rain. They'll be along our driveways whenever the church is open for prayer throughout the week. Please know of this invitation. And if you would ever like access to the church for prayer at other times, just let me know. We are open for prayer.

Senior Warden's Message



Vestry Committees

Our Vestry has been busy over the summer months; we don't take a vacation! I am excited to share the formation of three committees that will be focusing on topics aimed at uplifting the members of our congregation at Good Shepherd.

Reverend Ellie first

asked the Vestry to indicate their levels of interest in three key areas: Justice Ministry, Communication and Building and Grounds. Under these, we were fairly equally divided up. During our first in-person Vestry meeting in over three years (!), each group was tasked with creating a diagram of the specific issues we perceived that fell under each topic, list these in level of importance and brainstorm on some approaches to address them.

Obviously, each group had a myriad of items to address. With that, we are starting out hyperfocused on those that were clearly compelling, yet

could make a significant difference in the short run. Currently, the justice ministry committee is researching the Sacred Group Curriculum, and developing a schedule to bring this to the congregation. The communication committee is currently focused on reviewing our website, and making recommendations as to the content, and updates. This group is evaluating the interface of the website with the weekly blast and Shepherds Staff. The Building and Grounds committee will be compiling a list of projects, coordinating with the FinCom committee and the Vestry with prioritizing them.

What's key is that we are not looking to necessarily do all the heavy lifting. We ask for the Lord's guidance on how our parish and the congregation can proceed as a whole in these areas and what outcomes benefit the areas of greatest need. We seek to listen for God's voice, uning out the clamber of urgency and opinion. I ask that the congregation hold your Vestry up in prayer as we dive into this essential work.

are worshipping from the Book of Common Prayer, using Eucharistic Prayer A. At the 10am service, we are using a lovely Eucharistic prayer (#3) from Enriching our Worship. This particular liturgy

focuses on themes of thanksgiving and redemption. It identifies Jesus as eternal Word and Wisdom, drawing on ancient biblical and early Church tradition. This prayer is a terrific example of how a fresh, modern Eucharistic prayer recovers the use of ancient themes.



As you experience this prayer (and any Eucharistic prayer for that matter), you might ask yourself: Who does this text say God is? Who does it say we are? What does this mean for us? Such questions invite us to explore how these prayers speak to our hearts, minds and spirits. I'd love to know your reflections.

Liturgical Arts

The Liturgical arts committee is the group that changes the interior of the sanctuary as the church calendar changes. The goal is to enrich the worship experience of all the parishioners.

Believe it or not, we are already planning

for the upcoming Advent and Christmas seasons, which begins on the first day of Advent, Dec. 3. We decorate in stages during this seasaon.



We will begin decorating on **Saturday, Dec. 2nd** when we hang wreaths in the sanctuary and on the exterior windows. We also hang two banners at the front of the sanctury using a 10 foot ladder, so we will need two people who can lift and are comfortable on the ladders.

We will hang the garland and put up the

Advent tree in the narthex on **Saturday, Dec. 16**. This is a wonderful multi-generational and family event event. Many hands make light work!

Immediately after the **10:00 Advent 4 service on Dec. 24th**, we will switch all the decoration from Advent blue to the Christmas red and green decorations.

If you are looking for a way to become involved in parish life, this committee is fun and requires no meetings. Most of the times that we are busy it involves about 1-2 hours every few months. You don't need to be creative, but new ideas are always welcome. You just need the ability to work together. Being able to climb a 10 foot ladder is sometimes needed also.;)

Another Step towards Accessibility

Several years prior to the pandemic, the Vestry established three strategic goals for the parish. One of as to make our worship service more accessible. Hearing the lessons and sermon was difficult for some due to our poor sound system, and for others with hearing challenges. That goal led to the installation of a new sanctuary sound system in 2021. This system, with improved microphones and eight speakers, takes it much easier for everyone to hear and understand what's being said, no matter where they sit.

During the pandemic, our community faced geographic and physical challenges – we couldn't meet in person for worship, or we needed to be spaced far apart. Addressing this hurdle opened the door into the world of online services. Today, people can participate in the Sunday morning service live and interactively. We provide an online experience that sounds and feels immersive, as if the viewer were actually there in the church. This capability expands our reach to people with serious mobility issues, llness, and access over long distances. For the past 16 months, we have also created a video clip of the Gospel and sermon for each week and posted it to our website. YouTube channel, .

We continue to make our online worship

experience more accessible physically, geographically, virtually, and on-demand. We just introduced our latest improvement. **Beginning**October 1, the video clips posted online now include accurate, easy-to-read closed captioning. 



The weekend is co-ed, which means it is mixed gender. But it is not couple oriented. It is Christ oriented. The weekends are held at LaSallette Retreat Center in Attleboro Ma., a beautiful facility with great private acomodations. The weekends start on Thursday evening, and end on Sunday afternoon. This is a big time commitment, but we like to think of it as a vacation to take care of our own spiritual selves. The cost is \$290.00, but there are scholarships available.



Exciting News!

We received word last week from the folks at Rise Against Hunger that the 10,000 meals we packaged in May reached their destination in the Philippines where they will be distributed by the organization Convoy of Hope. The meals in the RAH container from New England totaled 285,120!

Read this message from RAH:

"The Philippines consists of over 7,000 islands in the Ring of Fire in the Pacific Ocean. One of the most environmentally disaster-prone countries in the world, it faces near constant threats of natural disasters like earthquakes, typhoons and volcanic eruptions. These disasters cause displacement and major loss of livelihoods and infrastructure, and disproportionately affect poor communities in rural areas, where people rely on agriculture and fishing. Rise Against Hunger serves the regions of the Philippines where hunger is most

urgent. To address some of the food security challenges that children, families, and communities in the Philippines face, Rise Against Hunger partners with organizations that support educational programs by providing meals to children at schools and early child development centers. This is a key part of Rise Against Hunger's Nourishing Lives pathway. In some cases, the food children receive at school will be the majority of the food they eat in a day. The meals you packaged will help ensure that children have access to the consistent nourishment they need to live healthy lives and successfully pursue their education."

Bill Maniscalco, our contact at RAH, was also excited to report that a full container ship of meals will leave later this month for Ukraine.

Creation Care

Update on the Season of Creation

The Season of Creation may be a distinct five-week period; however, it is clear that people at the Church of the Good Shepherd celebrate the natural world and take stewardship seriously all year long. The Creation Care Ministry Team learned a few lessons during this period of reflection.

First, it is great to encourage creativity alongside reflection. When the Sunday School kids made a collage of photos on the main triptych board, it looked truly joyous. (see p.8) The other photo collage of sustainability actions taken by different households was equally beautiful

and encouraging.



Another lesson is that surveys do not have to be scientific to be informative. Thanks to everyone who participated in the Pom-pom Survey! (results below.) It is inspiring that a good number of people have taken big actions to become more energy efficient and thoughtful about energy use at home.

Many folks have added additional insulation to their homes and a significant number of households have utilized air source heat pumps (sometimes called mini splits). Not only are heat pumps more efficient than oil, propane, and natural gas for heating and cooling, they are potentially fossil-fuel free.

It was also fun to discover how important gardening and composting are to quite a few households.


The one survey that felt more difficult was

about transportation. As we think about making our lives more sustainable, the choices are not always simple. And yet genuine stewardship of our creation is as beautiful as it is essential.

As the theologian Meister Eckhart wrote over 750 years ago, "Every single creature is full of God, and is a book about God." The gardeners amongst us would remind us that plants are also wondrous and part of the gift that is the web of life. We are all connected on this island Earth. Thank you for the many heartfelt conversations during the Season of Creation. Vestry Vignettes, August 2023

Rev. Ellie opened with grounding and prayer. The June 2023 meeting minutes were approved. The Vestry shared photos from their leisure time this summer.

Treasurer's Report:

Denise gave a finance update. Discussion around the handbell fund came up, along with a short discussion about using them during the service.

Rector's Report:

Beginning September 10, our regular schedule of 8 am and 10 am services will resume. Ellie wondered if we would want a picnic for this "homecoming." September 30 is Octoberfest in West Acton. Ellie invited us to staff a table at the event.

Good Shepherd has been invited to host a deanery Confirmation Service on February 10, 2024. This offers us an opportunity to invite confirmands from our region to be confirmed in our church. Ellie is exploring running a joint confirmation program with Trinity, Concord, given low numbers of youth at both churches.

We discussed the need to hire someone to work in our nursery on Sunday morning.

Warden's Report:

Discussion about our large sanctuary window repair was discussed, with both the sill and potentially also the glass being a problem. The replacement will be funded by Howard Kuenzler's estate. Tony Geanisis is receiving bids at this point.

Gail provided an update on repairs at Rectory. There is a lis of Rectory needs, and the Vestry discussed whether or not to provide tenants relief for electricity costs due to extra dehumidifiers. A motion that we offer financial relief to the Doss' to cover the additiona cost on the electric bills that they have incurred by running the dehumidifiers until the fan is repaired. All approved and Harry will ask for copies of electric bill to determine the amount.

Special Reports:

Jessie Panek approached the vestry on behalf of the Creation Care committee about putting solar panels on the roof of the church. She told us that panels on the sanctuary roof could cover all our electrical costs. One bid is \$89,000, before rebates and roughly 60,000 after. In 12 years, the panels will have paid for themselves. There are additional incentives which would reduce the time needed to recoup the cost. They ould like to get it started this Fall. The

Vestry Vignettes, September 2023

Our Vestry meeting was held in person at church for the first time since the start of Covid. Call to Order and Opening Prayer was offered by Ellie.

Treasurer's Report:

Denise went through the financials from August. We are generally on track for the year so far. Pledges were slightly down in August, but overall income continues to be up year-to-date. A few program areas are (or are nearly) over budget including Parish Life and Music. Denise and FinCom will look into whether some of the organ repairs/tuning expenses are better handled by designated funds, rather than the Annual Budget. Ellie has asked Ellen Oak to provide a detailed account of anticipated tuning costs for next budget process. Rectory expenses are anticipated to be over-budget due to significant maintenance issues this summer.

Fall Events:

Ellie and the Wardens discussed plans for the upcoming picnic this Sunday. Vestry is neouraged to help set up/clean up.

Oktoberfest is on Sept. 30, and we will have a booth. Ellie is looking for volunteers to help staff the booth for an hour or so. Catherine advised we have a large sign for our booth. We'll have brochures and other info about our church to share. Walk Against Hate is on Oct 15 at 2 pm. We are a sponsor which means we are listed on the event fliers and are responsible for helping to publicize the event. This is a walk from ABRHS to Gardner Field in W. Acton in response to recent anti-Semitic incidents at the schools and to unite against hate and prejudice in all its forms.

Rides to Church:

Bev shared concern for a number of 8 am parishioners who are need of a ride to and from church. FinCom suggested using a memorial fund for Uber rides. Margaret said the Pastoral Care Committee has a list of people who have volunteered in the

past to provide rides, and it is their ministry. Ellie will follow up as this is becoming a more pressing need as parishioners age.

Rector's Report:

Church School: K-grade 4 will be taught by Jen Thornton. Grades 5-8 will be led by Mary Bunker, with assistance from Karen Root-Watkins on occasion. The older students will be using a new curriculum this fall centered on climate justice. Church School will meet on the first and third Sundays of each month beginning Sept. 17.

Ellie is pulling together a confirmation program for high school youth with Trinity Church, Concord. Good Shepherd will host the deanery Confirmation Service on Feb. 10 with Bishop Carol Gallagher. We are anxious to get nursery care provided for families with young children. Ellie will work with Laura to create a job description to share with area early childhood programs and the HS job list. We have budged \$500 for 2023.

Vestry Planning Groups:

Assignments were given to each of the working groups. An update is to be provided by each group at the October Vestry meeting:

- Justice Ministry: Research Sacred Group curriculum & Samp; develop schedule/plan.
- Communication: Review website and make recommendations oncontent/updates. Consider relationship between website/ weekly eblast/ Shepherd's Staff.
- Building & Samp; Grounds: Begin to compile a list of building/grounds needs to assistvestry and FinCom with prioritizing projects.

Rectory Update:

(Harry Peebles joined us for this discussion as he is the Vestry-appointed liaison to our tenants in the Rectory). Many repairs have been completed and others are underway. A motion was made to spend \$625 to fix the sump pump drain in the rectory which passed with full agreement. A general contractor has been contacted to provide a quote for other repairs.

Other Business

Gail asked about status of backing up Laura's computer in the church office. Ellie will follow-up with Jason Davis about backing up to Google, which is the recommended process.

The meeting adjourned with a closing prayer from the New Zealand Prayer Book's Night Prayer service.

Vestry Vignettes, October 2023

Ellie called the meeting to order and opened with prayer.

Rectory Update:

The wardens reported that the sump pump has been repaired, the oil burner inspection for the year has been done, the range hood repair is in process, repair of loose pavers is in progress, and securing the unsecured cellar stairs is in progress. The Vestry members are grateful for Wendy, Gail, and Harry's management of the rectory. Wendy noted that the responsibilities of property management are best handled by a professional (not a volunteer) At church on Sunday, the hot water heater for the sacristy and the downstairs bathroom cracked; Dennis Dauplaise, our plumber, was on his way home from his church and very nearby, so he was able to stop by to make a temporary fix. Today it was replaced!

Treasurer's Report:

Finance committee met on Saturday to review the September report. No major changes to note (similar trends as prior months). We made up some of the August dip in pledges this month. Denise sent out interim pledge reports this past weekend, and she will send out another interim pledge statement in December. She will also likely mail out copies to folks who are significantly behind. Denise plans to analyze why pledges are over for the year so far. We've over budget in the Music and Parish Life expense categories. We are keeping an eye on electricity and heating fuel (which we have no control over). Overall, we're approximately \$9K over budget in net income for this point in the year!

Rector's Report:

Additional Rainbow Fish proposal:

Jessie Panek got a quote for five road signs \$337.50; the funding may come from a donor or a memorial fund (not Annual Budget). Margaret pointed out that the middle line in the proof should be green (not black). It was moved that we spend \$337.50 to hang five metal fish signs below our directional signs around the community. All were in favor. None opposed. Elllie will check to see if someone wants to make a donation.

West Acton Oktoberfest - We still need volunteers for Oktoberfest(particularly 12 -1 pm). The set-up window for CGS is 7:45 - 8:15 am; Wendy and Catherine will set up.

Walk Against Hate is meant to be a celebration of the diversity of our community and condemnation of hatred of all kinds. It has taken on new meaning in the context of the events in Israel this weekend. It starts on Sunday at 2:00 pm. Ellie will be speaking with other religious leaders. They will walk to Gardner Field with a celebration at the end. Margaret requested pictures for Shepherd's Staff.

Stewardship:

Lydia Tolley is helping to lead stewardship activities this season. Ellie invited members of the Vestry to help support this important ministry.

Rector's reflection:

Ellie reflected on how much pastoral work she and the Vestry have been engaged in, and, on a recent Clergy day she was inspired by the idea of *depreciative* and *appreciative spirits: Depreciative spirit* is when we're always measuring ourselves, striving for an old thing, not leaving room for God; an *appreciative spirit* is looking forwhat's right, rather than for what's wrong; what's possible rather than impossible...

With an appreciative spirit, Ellie has committed to putting out a sign welcoming peopleto come into

the Sanctuary and pray when she is at the church. Margaret suggestedthat we make the church more accessible for spontaneous prayer.

Vestry Planning Groups report:

Buildings and Grounds: Top priorities are solar and the repairing of the large window in the sanctuary. Tony is coordinating a quotes between a framer and a windowspecialist for the large window.

Solar Pannels: we have 3 quotes that are difficult to compare; work will happen in 2024.

Entrance railing project requires some design work, including deciding whichmaterials to use.

Communications: Group still needs to coordinate on recommendations. Ellie will share a list of website content edits and a competitive analysis that Laura did over the summer. Website is the primary place where prospective parishioners are learning about the church before setting foot in the building. Margaret requested that this group come up with a plan for keeping the website current. Wendy added that families really like to see photos of their kids on the website.

Social Justice: Group hasn't met yet. We adjourned with a closing prayer.
