### A Word from the Fold



#### Advent: The Beginning is Near

I saw a post the other day of a man standing on a street corner holding a handwritten sign that reads, "The Beginning is Near." Advent humor that would make my kids cringe, but it's not bad theology. We are now in the season of Advent, the beginning of our new liturgical year. We have entered this holy time of transition as we wait, prepare and welcome the Light that will come to us on Christmas. A new beginning.

Advent is a time of renewal and rebirth. We get to start our walk with Christ all over again, from the very beginning, as we reset the church calendar for another year. If our spiritual practices have lapsed, if our prayers have gotten inconsistent, if our worship attendance has fallen off, Advent is a wonderful time to explore starting up again.

Advent is also a time of change, which, I suppose you could say about every season. Yet, there's something especially poignant about change in Advent. As we begin Advent each year, we take stock of all that has changed in our lives, and in the world since last year. We reflect on what needs to be reborn, or begun. Advent proclaims, Christ is coming; Christ is here; Christ will come again. With the arrival of Christ comes change. We cannot help but be affected, be changed, by Christ. Jesus' very birth is a significant change from the way God interacted with Creation before. Jesus' promised return will bring more change. Jesus' presence in our hearts changes us daily, if we let it. Advent reminds us that change is not always about endings. It can come at the beginning, too.

On the First Sunday of Advent this year, we read from *Paul's letter to the Romans* which reminded us: "You know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armor of light..." (Romans 13:11-12). Change is stirring; change is coming.

Here at Good Shepherd, that spirit of change is echoed in the shift in our liturgy to an Advent setting in Common Worship, a modern liturgical resource from the Church of England. It is made manifest in the rearrangement of our worship space. The choir and piano are now up front, in a location many of you will remember from pre-Covid days. For others who have come to Good Shepherd in the last two+ years, including Deacon Ken, Ellen and myself, the return to something old is also something new. We'll live into these changes together knowing every change requires a spirit of grace and flexibility as we each adjust to what God is creating in our midst.

Advent invites us to live into the changes occurring all around us, reminding us that the only thing that doesn't change is God's love. We all change all the time. It is part of what it means to be human. -What it means to be in relationship with other people and with God. Advent reminds us that change is normal. It is unavoidable. Advent gives us four weeks, set apart, to pause and reflect on the change that is coming in Christ. To prepare for it. To watch for it. To practice change so that we can be flexible and resilient when it occurs, for the beginning is near.

Advent also acknowledges that change can be hard. Some change is unwelcome. Some change can break our hearts. On **Thursday, December 15 at 7pm**, our **Blue Christmas Candlelight Service of Healing and Hope** is an opportunity for those struggling with change or grief during the holiday season. It's a service filled with candlelight and grounded in prayer and Taizé music, designed to offer healing and hope, peace and encouragement for all our new beginnings.

## Senior Warden's Message



Before you start singing the song, the 'Blue Christmas' Candlelight service of Healing and Hope has nothing to do with Elvis, but it does have to do with missing someone or something. Blue Christmas services make room for sadness, loneliness, or loss during the holidays.

All are invited to a quiet, contemplative service of light and healing on **Thursday, December 15, at 7 pm.** The service incorporates the Taizé traditions of simple chants, meditation, and readings, providing a supportive space to those in need

of an alternative to traditional Christmas services and celebrations.

**Blue Christmas** has its foundation in ancient Yule celebrations of the Winter Solstice, celebrating the hope of returning light and life. Here we acknowledge that darkness will always be defeated by this brighter side. For people dealing with memories of loss and grief, this gathering can serve as a respite from the frenzied holiday shopping and pressures that Christmas in our culture can bring.

The ritual includes opportunities for expression of grief, pain, and heartbreak. Candles are lit at numerous occasions during the service; we commemorate those who have been lost during the previous year and reach toward hope for the future. Please join us for this service of comfort.

Want to read a lesson aloud in Sunday worship from your home? To read the lesson



remotely over Zoom, <u>sign up here.</u> Please know that during some portions of the service, the Zoom audio feed is routinely piped into the sanctuary. For example, just unmute to verbally contribute to Prayers of the People. Or use the Chat to get the zoom co-host's attention during Announcements, so they can announce you and the congregation can hear your announcement.

Zoomers, you are also invited to optionally turn on your video during the service. If you do, Ellie, Ken, and the LEMS could then see you on a monitor facing the altar. Routinely, other folks in the sanctuary do not see you.

There are lots of ways to find recordings from our church service. Sermons, the stewardship messages, and guest speakers are included on our website, just scroll to the bottom of the main page for the currently featured posts, or see



the News or Sermons page. This content is also available directly from our YouTube channel named <u>Church of the Good Shepherd, Acton, MA</u>. And of course, it's also posted to our Facebook page named <u>Churh of the Good Shepherd Acton (Episcopal)</u>. We



also provide recordings directly to guest musicians and speakers. Recent equipment improvements include the addition of a third

remote control camera. We are also arranging the microphone wires to be less obvious.

The Tech Team helps the worship service happen, like the greeters, lectionary readers, ushers, acolytes, LEMs, guest musicians, choir, or altar guild members. We manage the audio levels inside the sanctuary, and the real-time audio and video broadcast to  $\ensuremath{\text{Zoom}}.$ 

For all of you who longed to be members of the Audio/Visual squad in High School, now is your second chance. Come play with us and our state-of-the-art audio and visual mixing stations!

#### **Undies Sunday**

For many years, Church of the Good Shepherd members have collected socks and underwear for the residents of the Lowell Transitional Living Center (LTLC) and delivered them to church on what are affectionately known as Undies Sundays.

On November 20 th , we welcomed Isaiah Stevens, Director of LTLC, and Deb Leary, its Resource Development Manager. Isaiah shared his

journey with us. He said he chose to be a volunteer at LTLC years ago, when his mother was a resident after falling on hard times. In the past five years, he became an employee, graduated from college, and recently accepted the position as Director of the Lowell Transitional Living Cen-



ter after Andy McMahon's retirement.

Deb shared some updates, including the

purchase of 30 apartments that will house residents of LTLC as they transition from homelessness to their own homes. She described the center's ongoing needs for volunteers, especially in the donation center, which has been without volunteers



since the pandemic started. She said that there are "floor to ceiling" black bags of clothing that need sorting. Deb also described a grant-funded tech center that was created in the past year to help residents with basic tasks such as writing emails and resumes.

During coffee hour, we discussed a plan for another tour of LTLC for CGS members. (The last one was in January 2020 just before the pandemic.) We reviewed the possibility of volunteering in the donation center, tech center, and a visit to sing carols with the residents, employees, and LTLC volunteers this Christmas season.

This is a perfect time of year to ask loved ones for donations to LTLC on your behalf rather than storebought items. 




here in red sunglasses, proclaimed "I LOVE MATH" during a hands-on lesson about measurement units.

#### An Update on the Habibi Family

The Habibis were guests for Thanksgiving at a home in Acton. I'm sure that they have much to be thankful for, but I have learned that resettlement is HARD! After searching this fall for better housing, the Habibis were excited to find a newly renovated spacious apartment. However, their application was rejected because the owner felt their family was too large for the number of rooms. The Habibis then made plans to move to a much smaller place, but they realized within days of the move, that it would not be better than their existing situation, and so they decided to stay put until March when their lease terminates. They have begun sharing the cost of rent with the Partnership. Thank you to everyone who volunteered to help them move!

Often the jobs an immigrant can access impede learning English. Haidar is working the night shift in a job where no one speaks English or his

language, Dari. Although he is in English classes six hours a week, the lack of English exposure at work is making for slow progress. Learning English is crucial to obtaining a better job and working hours that mesh with family life. Haidar drove a taxi in Afghanistan but did not pass the drivers' test here. Although the written test for a driver's license can be in the applicant's native language, the driving test is requires understanding English. Habibi could not obtain a driver's license because he did not understand the verbal directions given him during the test, surely a hit to his dignity.

Aida is a great support to her family because she speaks fairly good English, but her fluency is not yet at a level that would enable her to attain her goal of attending college. She is enrolled in English classes through Middlesex Community College. For several months Aida had a job that required her to leave her home at 4:00am, pay an Uber for transportation, and work a 10-hour shift. She was falling asleep in her evening English classes, and so she decided to quit her job and pursue part time work.

Aida, who is 21, would like to obtain a driver's license, but she has only had the ten hours of driving instruction offered in adult classes, and so has struggled to pass the test. We now have a plan in place for volunteers to provide regular instruction so she can gain experience and confidence and have a better outcome on her third try. #### **Emmanuel in Ukraine**

Several members of the congregation have been in touch with Emmanuel Aronie who has moved to his family's native country of Ukraine where he has many friends. The needs are immense. We are talking with Emmanuel about how we can best support his efforts and plan to have a fundraiser in place later this month. Stay tuned!

One of Emmanuel's poems follows:

#### To a Russian General

Sir, I know you are out there, somewhere, I feel your presence,
You are a no-nonsense guy,
a very tough soldier,
and I know you can end this,
this enormous miscalculation,
Russia's invasion of Ukraine.
Maybe you thought t would take 3 days or a week

certainly, no longer than a month, or that Zelensky would run away, like a scared little mouse, a miscalculation. Maybe people told you that Ukraine wants you, maybe people, for their own reasons, told Putin, or perhaps he told himself,

"This is my destiny, our destiny, Ukraine is ours." Does greed have any boundaries?

No. Could Vlad's prized dream of empire slip through his fingers? Oh, yes.

Sir, open your eyes for a moment, you're a student of war and history,

with Putin's mobilization call, 1000's of your best and brightest people,

have left Russia or plan to leave, any way they can – in cars, trains, planes, on bikes, even,

on foot, to Kyrgyzstan, Georgia, Turkey, Finland. Poland, Norway, etc.

Note also that now,

some of your best and brightest IT people, so outraged by events, have begun hacking the Kremlin! Your leader has forced annexation on people who don't want it.

Of course, there are people everywhere, with an interest in power, who crave to put their hands on the steering wheel.

Of course, they support annexation.

But, the majority in Donetsk, Lugansk, Zaporizhe, Kherson, etc. ?? Not a chance, not even close to a majority; even, a casual observer knows this. Sir, you're a student of war and history, of good and evil, life and death.

Is not America's misguided adventure in Vietnam eerily similar to the here and now in Ukraine, which is today, worldwide, in everybody's face?

One photo showed it all, one beautiful photo– from the jungle on the Ho Chi Minh Trail,

a string of North Vietnamese women, trekking south, through dappled daylight jungle light, barefoot, heavy supplies and equipment on their heads, walking south – calmly, certainly, resolutely!! Why?

They would have walked 1000 miles for a 1000 years, if needed.

And so it is today in Ukraine.

Sir, I know you are out there, you have a great soul and great courage, and I know, if you wish,

You could end this madness.

Certainly, the original 44 million Ukrainian residents – worried, harassed, intimidated, raped, stolen from, wounded and killed, with many forced to leave their lives and property, certainly, they all would like to return to a normal life. Sir, put your foot down and pull your troops out, forgood!

Save the Russian soldiers!

Let them be normal sons, brothers, husbands and fathers.

Let them go home, alive and whole.

When and IF the "contested regions", truly and freely, want to choose their fate and direction, so be it, let them,

but not at the point of a gun, or because 450 Duma rubberstamps for a dictator, vote "yes, we agree". Fooey!! You have annexed something that is not yours. And lastly, one more thing - there is a photograph, that should have ended the war months ago - -A mother and her two children, after intense hospital care, sit for a moment, in Lviv's central railroad station, a mom and her twins, a boy and a girl, maybe 10 years old, all, totally traumatized, a loving mother holds her children close, all glad to be alivethe girl has nubs only, no feet, they were blown off by a Russian cluster bomb, outside on the platform, at an Eastern Ukraine railroad station. The mother has one foot and a nub only. The twin brother, lucky to be inside the station at the time, is whole, but scarred for life. Everybody on the planet should see this photo. Sir, how many more terrible events must happen, before you take swift and certain action? Sir, I know you can do this. The world is waiting for you. Make your move. We have a planet to save.

#### Elevator update—Fixed!

Apologies to anyone who would have liked to use our church elevator these last few months. It took the elevator company a long time to figure out why it wasn't working. Something kept shorting out the electrical system, and a number of parts had to be replaced. The best guess is that, as everything settled over time, some of the wires going to the controls outside the elevator doors shifted slightly and touched a drywall screw. ## Treasurer's Report

Preliminary financial results through the end of November show a year-to-date net income of a little over \$10,000. Through this

point in the year we had budgeted net income of just over \$1,000. Through the end of the year we proj-

ect that we will end up slightly better than budgeted. You may recall that our budget for 2022 projected an annual loss of \$13,859, but we now expect to do slightly better than that. Thank you to everyone for keeping your pledges up to date.

#### **Vestry Vingettes**

The meeting opened with a prayer led by Ellie; a Compline recording "Let There Be Peace on Earth", sung by the Voices of Hope Children's Choir, was played. A meditation followed to ease tensions that ight be felt as the Vestry met on Election Day. The Minutes of the October 11th were accepted.

#### Finance:

The budget is on track through this month. Pledged income year-to-date is behind by around \$6,000. This could be due to the timing of posting payments. It has been offset by the Plate offering, other receipts, and prior year pledge payments. As a result, we are \$4,000 ahead of projected income. Some expenses are over budget, some under budget. Through the end of the year, we will likely be over budget due to heating expenses and plowing. This can be partially offset by savings.

The income accounting has been further complicated due to the recording in the books of monies taken infor our sponsored Afghan family as it has yet to be spent. Denise asked for a motion to put these monies into a separate fund. The motion was moved and accepted.

Some questions on the budget as presented included Ellen asking about the increase in utility costs. Denise confirmed that \$400 of the \$1,500 YTD is due to the new tenant using the kitchen. Ellie confirmed that Nina, the caterer, will be using the kitchen each week on Tuesday and Thursday per the agreed schedule at the \$100 per day rate. This will offset the energy costs. It was not determined if

Nina using the kitchen as a trial run was the direct cause of the \$400 increase.

Ellie summarized for the Vestry other sources of income for use of the Parish Hall, which have included an Indian cultural group, music recitals, weddings, baptisms, and school team dinners as examples.

#### **Rectory Rent and General Repairs:**

A discussion was raised by Denise about the Rectory rent. Multiple numbers and goals had been mentioned. One such statement included the desire to increase the monthly rent well above a 3% hike. But such a large increase should be delayed until tenant turnover. The Finance Committee would like to raise the rent beginning in January 2023, giving the tenant notice about this now. The rent is still comparatively low for comparable properties for the town of Acton and this region. Once the current tenant moves out, it is anticipated the rental rate will be brought up to full market rate at that time.

The chimney repairs are scheduled for next week. The elevator at church is still awaiting a part to be eplaced.

#### **Stewardship Committee Report:**

Harry is leading the Stewardship team; he led the discussion of the upcoming pledge drive. The stewardship team includes Ronnie Diesl, Chris, O'Leary, Gail Lyons, and Rev. Ellie.

Early budget projections put us at an 8% deficit at the end of this year. For 2023, we are asking for an additional 5% increase in pledges. Denise will have a draft 2023 budget by the end of November. In the past, the conversation about pledging focused

on operational aspects. This year, the approach will be focused on our core values, with an emphasis on intentional giving. The letters will address common questions, such as:

- What is pledging
- Why do we pledge (being responsible)
- Tax implications
- Who can I talk to about pledging (Wardens)
- How do I make a pledge
- How much should I give

The rollout of the pledge drive was outlined as follows:

A. The Pledge Drive started on 11/6 with Ellie's sermon, which set the tone

B. Personal Testimonies will be shared on the four following consecutive Sundays leading up to the Ingathering on December 4 th . Our presenters are Gail Lyons, Harry Peebles, Nancy Brown, and Barb McGee.

C. Two versions of the pledge letters will be drafted, approved by the committee, and sent to the congregation next week

- A current church member who is an established giver
- A relatively new member who hasn't given before D. The mailer will include the cover letter, a pledge card, a simple trifold brochure discussing pledging, and a budget pie chart that illustrates where our income is spent in the areas of Salaries, Facilities, Diocese and Ministries.

Gail Lyons asked if we were going to discuss dollar amounts specifically, will this be in the letters rather than the brochure? If we asked specifically for what we need, we would get a better response. Harry Peebles asked Denise to supply numbers in the brochure.

Ellen Harland asked if we can still discuss a budget for a church school administrator. This was tabled for a future Vestry meeting.

An ingathering event will be held after the December 4 th 10:00AM service, taking the form of a more extended coffee hour, with a craft for all to participate in. Raphael asked about decorations incorporating the color purple since this takes place during Advent. He will ask Jessie Panek and Barbara Meglis if they would like to participate in decorating the Parish Hall. John asked if we need a Christmas tree for the 4th..

#### **Holiday Schedule:**

Ellie discussed the Christmas services sched-

ule. John Link asked if there would be music for the Christmas Day service. It was confirmed Ellen is planning to play for the one service at 9:00AM. John also suggested, on the secular side, if we would consider having a holiday theme movie night, especially if we show "The Bishop's Wife". Gail asked if we were planning a Lessons and Carols service this year. Ellie said this will be scheduled during Epiphany.

Signage for advertising our holiday services, Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and Blue Christmas was discussed. Options include lawn signs at key corners in Acton, or a banner. Wendy will research locations and costs.

#### **Mission Strategy:**

Ellie discussed the Invite/Welcome/Connect program, created by the Mission Strategy Committee. A booklet was introduced at the Diocesan Convention. It is a process of reimagining church to inspire congregations to participate in evangelism. Three orientation sessions were coming up via Zoom, and Ellie encouraged us all to sign up for one of them: November 17 th , 10:00AM, November 13 th , 7:00PM, November 16 th , 7:00PM.

We will decide at the next Vestry meeting if we want to be a part of this program. The booklet is at the church for our review.

#### **Diocesan Convention:**

Ellie, Wendy, Ken Schmidt, and Peter Church attended the in-person convention this year representing Good Shepherd. Ellen was at a Cursillo booth in the expo center. Chuba also attended.

Key business and topics of the convention were touched upon, including the selection of a Substitute Bishop to replace Bishop Gayle Harris for an interim time, the reparation funds being budgeted for black churches, indigenous people's recognition initiative, stipend for Deacons, support to create a more multicultural diverse church leadership, and Bishop Gates' address to the gathering.

The meeting ended with prayer.

## 2022 Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts 237th Annual Convention Summary Report

Church of the Good Shepherd attendees: The Rev. Eleanor Applewhite Terry, Ken Schmidt, Deacon, Wendy Feddersen and Peter Church, Diocesan



representatives
The convention
was held on October 29 at the
DoubleTree hotel
in Danvers, MA.
This was the first
in-person event
held since 2019.

#### Business Highlights:

The 2023 Diocesan budget was approved unanimously

Clergy Compensation and Benefits – The 2023 TCC Standard formula was defined for full time, active clergy.

#### **Key Resolutions:** New Bishop Suffragan

Bishop Gates proposed to not have a successor bishop suffragan to replace Bishop Harris. The convention voted to create an assistant bishop position and authorized Gates to appoint an eligible bishop to that position, with the advice of the Executive Committee of Diocesan Council and consent of the Standing Committee. There was quite a bit of discussion about this at the convention. One key point that was brought forward was to make sure diversity of a potential candidate is kept in mind. Part of the decision for this change were associated to costs of a nationwide search for a new bishop suffragan.

#### **Reparations Fund**

The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts Reparations Fund was resolved as part of our effort to address the legacy of wealth accumulated through the enslaved labor of Africans and Afro-Caribbeans on our behalf, and for our use even today. The initial pool of resources will total approximately \$3 million, as investment income for the Fund, with the goal of reaching \$10 million These will be made up in part



of draws from the Trustees of Donations unrestricted trusts, unrestricted agency funds and bishopdirected funds. There will also be funds contributed through an increase in parish assessments. The Diocese has also urged individual worshiping communities to commit a percentage of their endowments as well. Timing for the fund to be included in the annual budget is scheduled to begin in 2024.

In conjunction to this resolution, there was a call to improve diversity of ordained leaders in the Church, supporting cross cultural ministries which can engage and lead difficult conversations within communities, with proficiencies in multiple languages. The Racial Justice Commission has been tasked to work with the Commission on Ministry and Office of the Canon for Ordained Vocations to support the program.

#### **Minimal Assessable Compensation**

A policy was approved for each Permanent Deacon to be provided with minimal compensation for the first time. This will be forwarded to the Church Pension Fund on their behalf.

#### Poor People's Campaign

A resolution was passed for individuals, congregations, and deaneries in the Diocese to join in solidarity with the Massachusetts Poor People's Campaign through education, formation, engagement, support, and actions to live into our mission strategy.

The Poor People's Campaign, or Poor People's March on Washington, was a 1968 effort to gain economic justice for poor people in the United States. It was organized by Martin Luther King, Jr., and the Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) and carried out under the leadership of Ralph Abernathy in the wake of King's assassination in April 1968.

After presenting an organized set of demands to Congress and executive agencies, participants set up a 3,000-person protest camp on the Washington Mall, where they stayed for six weeks in the spring of 1968.

The campaign did produce some changes, however subtle. They included more money for free and reduced lunches for school children and Head Start programs in Mississippi and Alabama. The USDA released surplus commodities to the nation's 1000 poorest counties, food stamps were expanded, and some federal welfare guidelines were streamlined.

The Poor People's Campaign has been supporting a broader movement to be launched in May 2023, a Third Reconstruction, defined as a revival of a constitutional commitment to establish justice, provide for the general welfare, and end decades of austerity. This initiative is recognized in 45 state coordinating committees and by a network of more than 250 labor and organizational partners, hundreds of faith partners, and dozens of national faith bodies.

## Fostering Right Relationship: The Episcopal Diocese of Massachusetts, Indigenous Episcopalians, and our Indigenous Neighbors

This resolution asked that the Diocese acknowledge that we live, work and worship on ancestral lands of Indigenous Peoples, and to make public statements acknowledging this whenever possible. A special working group from the Subcommittee of the Reparations of the Racial Justice Commission will explore and implement this policy. The Diocese has also asked parishes designate one Sunday a year, beginning in 2023, to honor the people indigenous to these lands.

## Resolution in Thanksgiving to God for the Episcopacy of The Rt. Rev. Gayle E Harris

The entire Diocese expressed their profound grati-

tude for Rev. Harris, in the 20th year of her episcopacy, for her faithfulness to our part of the Jesus Movement and her support and love of the people of God in eastern Massachusetts. Of the



many contributions acknowledged at the convention, some of the highlights included:

- Support and oversight of the formation and ministry of our vocational deacons
- $\cdot$  Championing of Palestinian Christians and leadership of Holy Land pilgrimages
- Leadership of the Mass Council of Churches
- · Personal engagement with youth, and Black, Indigenous and People of Color communities

A video message from our Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Michael B Curry was shown, and an address by Bishop Alan Gates both thanked Bishop Gayle for her care, love, and advocacy that made a "beloved community more possible in our midst." The Diocese resolved that we will miss Bishop Gayle and her formal role in our lives, and we wish her Godspeed and much joy in her retirement.
