A Word from the Fold



A few thoughts as we approach the summer months and anticipate a return to more normal life as the pandemic wanes.

First, an expression of deep gratitude. The wardens, Regathering Team and I are extremely grateful to our beloved congregation for your steadfast patience and commitment to following the restrictions that have been in place to keep us all safe. It has not always been easy, or comfortable. Yet, as I acknowledged in my Pentecost sermon, there is no more Christ-like ministry than to care

for those most vulnerable among us. You have kept the faith, honored the restrictions and remained engaged, despite the loss of our in-person worship and fellowship. Thank you for your faithfulness and commitment.

An expression of deep gratitude, part two, to our amazing tech team! I am not sure how many of your realize how hard this great group of people work to ensure a smooth worship experience for all of us. It takes many hours of preparation each week. They arrive at least an hour and half before the service begins to set up the equipment that allows for our services to be live-streamed and audible to both our in-person and remote congregations. They have learned to trouble-shoot all kinds of issues which inevitably happen. Please offer your thanks to them, especially Tom Hoch and Jon Panek, the masterminds behind the laptops and control panels! If you are interested in joining this talented team, please let them know. They offer great training, a guiding hand, and the satisfaction of participating in a new form of vital ministry.

Second, a request to remain patient and compassionate. As much as we might wish for an immediate full return to the lives we had before, our regathering as a church community will continue to be a gradual one. It is important to remember that not all of us are vaccinated – including every child under the age of 12. As a parish that prides itself on its love for children, and their central role in our life and worship, we need to remember that our younger children remain vulnerable to COVID, as do some adults with certain medical conditions. We have made tremendous progress in our fight against COVID, but it is not over yet. We will continue to face restrictions, wear our masks inside, and follow the recommended safety measures until all of us are safe from harm.

Third, a reminder that while much has changed (and that's not always a bad thing), we have been able to keep many ministries alive throughout the pandemic. New ministries have sprung up. Others have changed. Some may not return. We have an opportunity to listen deeply for God's call to our community. What is essential about our life in Christ as lived out here at Good Shepherd? What might we embrace as we discern the future together? Where is God challenging us to grow? What have we learned about ourselves that we might share with those beyond our community?

Finally, a call to rejoice as we approach the time of summer sabbath. We have worked hard and endured much over the past year. I pray that all of us may take some time off this summer to be refreshed in the Spirit, enjoy the loosening restrictions (as may be best for us), and perhaps even venture forth to enjoy a bit of summer travel.

Warden's Message



As we contemplate reopening, I find myself thinking of the children and youth who have been so much less visible to me during these months, despite Taryn's creative and faithful efforts to keep them engaged. It was a joyful sight to see a band of kids processing with the Peace Dove and the red and orange streamers at

today's Pentecost service. And I relished the cluster of kids around the lemonade table after the service, debating who would prefer pink versus yellow lemonade. They were dutifully masked, without questioning, while the adults, mostly vaccinated, were mostly unmasked. I felt a twinge of guilt that I was able to be unmasked, while they accepted that they were still vulnerable and still potentially able to expose others to an unseen illness. They have been so patient through this very trying time.

I have always liked to see the children and young people participating in the service, in the traditional ways such as serving as crucifer, or acolyte, or reading a lesson, or singing in the choir. I've been touched by their appeals for their service projects, showing up with home-made signs nervously stepping into the lectern to make announcements to the congregation. Equally, I have enjoyed seeing them race around the Parish Hall or out on the playground after the service. I've even enjoyed their harmless shenanigans, as they take the opportunity to check out the coffee hour food spread in the Parish Hall on the way back from a bathroom break during the service.

But, most of all, I like the sense I get that they feel that the church is a safe place, where they can move around freely and not just their parents are keeping at least a half of an eye out for them. And it's not just the adults who are supporting them. It is their peers also, especially as they move into their middle school and teen years. And it's other adults, during a phase of growing up when it's easier to open up with adults who aren't your parents.

For my part, with the auction moving into the rear view mirror (and thank you, all, for your generous support and contributions), I want to focus on what we can do to welcome kids and families back, as immunity and safety allows, not just through church school but also through other activities. Maybe we can start with a kids and family barbecue, or an outdoor storytelling session, movie, or karaoke night, or an outdoor Christian rock concert. The children and youth — and their families — have struggled uniquely through this pandemic. As wonderful as Taryn is, she cannot do this alone. Let's all think about ways we can support the children and youth, and their families, as we make our reopening plans. There is ample creativity within this community, and plenty of commitment to match it.

Regathering Team update

On Thursday, May 20, our Bishops issued a new Pastoral Letter with updated COVID-19 Guidelines for the Episcopal Churches in our Diocese. A link to their full letter is included below.

The new guidelines offer some very exciting and hopeful guidance which reflects the rapidly changing and improving conditions of the pandemic. The Bishops' letter also continues to offer strong cautions that "we must still be vigilant to protect one another."

Our Regathering Team met on Tuesday, May 25 to consider the updated guidelines. We believe the best process toward more fully reopening our church building to worship and other activities is a gradual one. We know that there are many members of our beloved Good Shepherd family (including all children under the age of 12 and adults with certain health conditions) who are not able to be vaccinated. It continues to be important that we prioritize the health and safety of all our households, especially those most vulnerable among us.

In light of the Bishops' May 20 Pastoral Letter:

Regarding worship this summer:

• We will continue to worship outdoors in the parking lot on Sundays. There are no attendance limits and no further contact

tracing or advance sign-up will be required. We urge families to practice social distancing of 6 feet between other households. Per CDC guidelines, those who are not yet vaccinated should continue wearing a face covering and maintain physical distance. We encourage all worshipers to maintain these precautions in order to protect one another.

Outdoor singing by both choir and congregation is now permitted. We look forward to singing together in the coming weeks! Masks and social distancing will remain necessary. Keep an eye on the E-blast for updates.

Coffee Hour with food and drink is back! In the summer, it will be served outside, in individual portions (no buffet, or common plate).

Our Sunday service will continue to be live-streamed on Zoom to enable those who worship from home to participate in the liturgy (including as lectors and intercessors).

On rainy Sundays, until further notice, we will offer a full Zoom service without an inperson congregation. Later this summer, once the tech set-up in the church has been modified for in-person attendance, we may be able to offer an in-person option for rainy days. Watch the E-blast for updates and check Facebook on Saturdays for any weather-related changes to the worship schedule/location.

Sunday, September 12 is the target date for a return to in-person, indoor worship at both 8am and 10am.

Regarding use of our building:

 Masks continue to be required for everyone when in the building, whether or not you are fully vaccinated. The only exception is for staff working in their offices and when others are not present.

Vaccination (or a medical exemption) will be required of all church staff, musicians/ choristers and volunteer leaders of Christian formation (especially with children). No proof of vaccination is required to attend worship, however we strongly encourage all members to be vaccinated against the coronavirus as soon as they are eligible.

When we resume in-person worship, capacity in the church is capped at 50% of occupancy (or 125 people) until July 1, after which we can return to full capacity (250). Social distancing is still recommended, however, so our actual numbers will be considerably lower.

Summer Liturgy



Beginning this coming **Sunday, May 23**, our liturgy will be drawn from *A New Zealand Prayer Book*. Many of you will be familiar with this setting, as it is one that has been used in prior summers here at Good Shepherd. We will continue to celebrate the Holy Eucharist both in person and

live-streamed on Zoom for those of you who prefer to worship from home.

Since the very first *Book of Common Prayer* was published in England in 1549, the use of a common form of worship in the vernacular language of the people (as opposed to Latin) has been a hallmark of Anglican worship. Today, books of Common Prayer exist in over 50 countries throughout the Anglican Communion of churches, and are used in over 150 languages. *A New Zealand Prayer Book* is the authorized form of the Book of Common Prayer for our sister church the Anglican Church of New Zealand. It was first authorized for use in 1988.



According to its forward, "A New Zealand Prayer Book/He Karakia Mihinare o Aotearoa" reflects the importance of ecology and environmentalism, Māori and Pasefika identity, principals of the Treaty of Waitangi, equal partnership between women and men, and the centrality of lay ministry. These priorities remain central to our theology and community life across our islands, and thus continue to be hugely significant to our liturgical formation." (Forward, ix)

It is precisely these priorities, which flow through the prayers and liturgies, that make *A New Zealand Prayer Book* such a beautiful and beloved resource throughout the Anglican world, including here at Good Shepherd. Its commitment to themes of creation care make it a particularly appropriate choice for our summer outdoor services.

Would You Like to Be a Lector?

Do you enjoy reading aloud? We always need more people to read the weekly lessons during the Sunday 10 am service. Being a lector is a minimal commitment, as you get to choose the dates you are available. Also, you can read in-person or from home via Zoom. How convenient is that? I typically send the readings to the week's lectors by Wednesday, so that the readers have time to review the lessons and feel comfortable with the text. I use Sign-up Genius for scheduling, which is convenient for readers and for me.






Christian Formation

enabling them to resume leadership in overcoming and redressing America's legacy of racial division.

Cristosal

In the last two weeks six members of our



congregation, including Rev. Ellie, have had three meetings with staff persons from Sen. Warren, Sen. Markey, and Rep. Trahan's offices to share our concerns about the

autocratic changes in El Salvador and specifically the vulnerability of our friends working at Cristosal. We worked together prior to the meetings to craft our message and assign roles. We specifically asked for their support to pressure the Salvadoran government to safeguard human rights workers and to put it on notice that the United States is watching their actions.

Here are some outcomes:

We've begun to form relationships with a Regional Director (Markey), a Chief of Staff (Trahan), the staff Immigration Specialist (Warren) and a MetroWest Regional Director (Warren). They know who we are now and why we are invested in the issues in this part of the world. Good Shepherd is on the map!! Cristosal is a known name to notice, seek out, and pay attention to in the news.

We've learned a lot about political process:

It helped a lot when we were very specific about what we needed for communication. Warren's staff assured us that these meetings make a difference. It helped to clarify expectations for further communication.

•

- Sen. Merkley (Oregon) is the lead person on the Senate Foreign Affairs Committee overseeing Central America. Action is likely to come from his office and then Markey and Warren would decide whether and how to support it. We need an Oregon constituent to open the door to a conversation with his office. Warren's office would then facilitate connecting us to the appropriate person at Merkley's office.
- Rep. Trahan is on the Hispanic Caucus which met last week with VP Harris about the Northern Triangle countries (Honduras, Guatemala, El Salvador). Her Chief of Staff will get back to us with information about what was discussed at that meeting.

It has been energizing learning how to be actively engaged citizens and finding that our legislators do want to hear from us. I feel strongly that we have a responsibility to use our delegation experiences and relationships to advocate for the vulnerable democracy that so many of our friends in El Ocotillo fought for in their long civil war.

Cristosal is teaching the Salvadorans how to demand their constitutional rights as citizens of a

democracy. The Cristosal Advocacy Group is teaching us how to do the same in our country on behalf of this southern neighbor. We've all learned this year that democracies must be tended to survive. It is a circle.....

In the next weeks we will continue to take steps to get the word out about our concerns and specifically to find an Oregon connection for a meeting with Sen. Merkley. If you have any interest in these issues or would like to learn with us how to do the work of citizenry, please reach out to Barb Magee.


As we've gotten better about using less oil and gas for energy and transportation, the fossil fuel industry has found a lifeline in plastics.

Treasurer's Report

Through the end of April we are ahead of budget by \$11,000, with pledges ahead of projection and expenses less than estimated. However, most of this is variance is due to timing and is expected to even out by the end of the year.

We are in the process of switching over to a new pledge and contribution tracking system that has a number of benefits. Once of these is that it provides the ability to send periodic and annual statements by email instead of regular mail, which will save time, paper and postage expense. Another is that it provides an integrated online giving feature – the online contribution link is already available on our website. Over time this link is expected to replace PayPal.

It was pointed out that as part of the Strategic Visioning Process, we came up with guidelines on how to spend Church resources. We might use those guidelines to explore whether we should partner with another church or do a community-based approach

The budget is on track, and we are over in pledges and under on expenses, mostly due to timing. We're in good shape.

Rector's Remarks:

There is a possibility we may get a new Deacon, it will be explored further. Ellie is fully vaccinated so she has been more intentional about doing onsite pastoral care visits. For the same reason Ellie is spending more time in the office.

Anna shared a draft of the Tech Survey that will be sent to people sometime after the auction closes. The Vestry provided feedback on the survey draft. There was also some discussion about having the entire service recorded so that people could worship at other times, but that has challenges with privacy rights and copyrights.

Worship is moving forward, outdoor church will be available most weeks (weather permitting).

We discussed The Summer schedule, both the pros and cons of moving to one 9am service during the summer months, and we would like to understand the impact on the technology before making a final decision
