A Word from the Fold



As I worked with the kids and their parents in preparation for Special Communion Sunday on June 4, I got thinking about our theology of including kids in the Holy Eucharist. In the Episcopal Church, it is normative for all the baptized, regardless of age, to receive Holy Communion. Baptism is the entry rite into full life and participation in the Church. There is no other requirement to participate in Holy Communion. No minimum age. No expectation that one be confirmed or complete particular instruction. All are welcome as baptized members to begin receiving Holy Communion at any age.

For those of us who came of age in a tradition other than the Episcopal Church, or did so prior to the publication of the 1979 Book of Common Prayer, we may recall a time when young children did not participate in Holy Communion. It was taught that the Sacrament was reserved only for those old enough to understand it, or who had received "first Communion" instruction, or had been confirmed. The implication was that children were somehow not holy enough, or not mature enough, to receive something so sacred.

That was not the experience throughout much of church history, however. All the baptized, including very young children, received the Eucharist from the earliest days of the church through the 11th c. In medieval times, as the Church became more powerful and developed rules and norms that governed and controlled the role of the laity, children were restricted from the Eucharist. By the 16th c. Council of Trent, Communion was understood to be "neither necessary nor appropriate for children".¹

That view began to change in the Episcopal Church in the 1970s. Parents, parishes and priests came to realize that, in fact, Communion "is an integral part of a child's Christian experience."² The *1979 Prayer Book* introduced a renewed understanding of the historic importance of baptism as the qualifying experience for Holy Communion. That meant even young children had a right to receive the Eucharist as baptized members of the Body of Christ. Today, it is not uncommon for one's first Communion to be the day of their baptism. Even babies can participate by taking a small portion of the wafer, or a drop of wine, from their parents. I had a classmate in seminary who would dip his finger in the chalice so his infant daughter could receive a tiny drop of wine on her lips beginning the day she was baptized. I asked him why he did this given how very young his baby was. He said he never wanted her to know a day when she wasn't welcomed and included at God's altar. I've always admired his response, even if most kids in my experience, including my own, are a bit older than that when they first receive.

Children may not yet fully understand what is happening when they receive Communion, but even young children know what it is like to be included. Children have an innate ability to sense when something special is happening around them. They can be very attuned to ritual. They observe and mimic. They place their open hands at the altar rail when they see their parents do so, and their eyes light up when they are offered some of the special food. For many parents, the decision when their child begins to receive Communion happens organically. A day comes when the child, led by the Holy Spirit, is ready and puts out her open hands.

Other families choose the time intentionally- waiting until a particular age or day when their child begins to receive. My approach is to encourage parents to choose what is best for them and their child, knowing that their children are welcome to participate at any time.

Here at Good Shepherd, instruction for kids and youth about Holy Communion is offered throughout their church school years. Whether they have been receiving all along, or have not yet begun to take Communion, it's important for kids (and adults, as well) to have opportunity to learn, think and reflect upon the importance of this most special sacrament. How we understand what happens in the Holy Eucharist, what it means to each of us personally, is part of the journey of faith. Our connection to Christ through the Eucharist develops as we bring our joys, burdens, concerns, sorrows, and faith to the altar over the course of a lifetime. What matters, no matter our age, is not how much we know or understand of the theology of Communion, but that we have a place at the Table. That we are worthy and invited to be part of the Body of Christ, because this is God's table and all are welcome.


Coming up on Sunday, June 4, we will have a

Worship

Summer Worship Return to the Book of Common Prayer

Beginning on Sunday, June 4, Trinity Sunday, our 10am service switches to a service from the *Book of Common Prayer*. At both the 8am and 10am services we'll be using Eucharistic Prayer B. This Eucharistic Prayer was written for the 1979 Book of Common Prayer. It incorporates language from a eucharistic prayer written by the Most Rev. Frank Griswold, who served as the 25th Presiding Bishop of The Episcopal Church



1998-2006. It also contains elements from Eastern Orthodox liturgies and an Anglican communion prayer from the 1549 Prayer Book. It is a great example of the way modern liturgies combine elements and images from earlier sources to create fresh new expressions of prayer. There will be two services, at 8am and 10am through June.

9am Worship in July & August

On Sunday, July 2 we will switch to a new summer schedule and have one service at 9am through Labor Day. Most Sundays, this will continue to be a service of Holy Eucharistic from the Book of Common Prayer. The service will be designed to be less than an hour in length. Back during the first year of the Pandemic, we held one service. Many people appreciated that experience and the opportunity to worship and get to know people from the service other than the one they normally attended. We look forward to worshipping together again this summer as we continue to build back our Good Shepherd community. One service will also offer an easier pace for the altar guild, coffee hour hosts, musicians and other liturgical leaders (LEMs, readers, ushers) at a time of year when many are traveling and our numbers are thin.

Outdoor Worship in August

We hope to hold services outdoors on the Sundays in August, and Labor Day weekend, weather permitted. Many of us came to truly love worshiping outside during the Pandemic (with a hearty few of us continuing to do so throughout most of the winter of 2020-21). Stay tuned for further details as those plans come together.

We will return to our usual 8am and 10am services on September 10.

Special Communion Sunday, June 4

This year we reimagined Special Communion Sunday as an all-ages celebration of all children as full members of the Body of Christ. The children were invited to join Deacon Ken and me on Saturday, June 3 for an afternoon of instruction, eucharistic show and tell, and to bake Communion Bread for our service on Sunday. I also joined the older church school class on May 21 to offer some additional instruction.

On Sunday, June 4 our liturgy was in the form of an Instructed Eucharist, a "director's cut" of

Rise Against Hunger Event

On May 21 we worked to the beat of happy music and the sounds of conversation and laughter. The hum of busy workers was interrupted periodically by a child sounding the gong in celebration of another 1000 meals packaged towards our goal. Seventy-three people, ages one to eightysomething, worked toward one purpose: to package 10,000 meals for a community far from Acton. We divided up at stations to measure, weigh, seal and count meals of soy, dehydrated vegetables and rice. The children joined us at these jobs or chose to be runners, zipping baskets of meals from table to table and ultimately into boxes. Little girls proudly lifted heavy boxes onto trolleys smiling with an "I can do it" spirit.

We learned from Marc Vermouth, the National Director of Rise Against Hunger, about the realities of hunger in other parts of the world and the change that takes place in schools when children receive the meals that we were preparing. The meal packaging is one leg of their mission to build sustainable agricultural practices in food insecure villages.

By 2:15 pm the boxes were on the truck, a group photo was taken (hairnets and all), and the parish hall was quickly cleaned by a large enthusias-

tic crew.

Thank you to everyone who made this **Rise Against Hunger** event so special: the generous donors, the set-up crew, the packaging gang and the clean up crew. Our work will make a difference in the lives of many people.



Treasurer's Report

Through the end of April we are tracking pretty close to our year-to-date budget with Net Income of \$3,300 versus budgeted year-to-date Net Income of \$1,500. This is made up of actual Income of \$125,000 versus a budgeted Income amount of \$124,000 and actual Expenses of \$122,000 versus budgeted expenses of \$123,000.

We plan to send out interim pledge statements at the end of June by email. Thank you in advance for keeping up with your pledge payments over the summer.

May Vestry Vignettes

We opened with prayer and then approved the previous minutes.

Wardens and Rector led an orientation to vestry leadership during the first half of the meeting. We began with a discussion of spiritual gifts and Ellie shared a Spiritual Gifts Inventory for the Vestry to use. A Vestry job description was shared and discussed, as well as a link to the current issue of Vestry Papers, which is an online leadership resource. Monthly issues will be shared electronically with the Vestry throughout the year.

The Vestry was informed of new memorial funds created in memory of recently deceased parishioners Bruce Stevenson, Marge Kennedy and Donna Heaney. The Heaney family has asked that donations in Donna's name be given toward the upkeep of the Memorial Garden where she is now interred. This memorial gift is very timely as there have been discussions about the need to refresh some of the plantings - the deer have enjoyed some of the shrubs way too much.

Plans were made for the June 4 Parish Picnic which will also celebrate a Special Communion for our children. The June 17 Acton Pride Festival which we will be part of was also planned.
